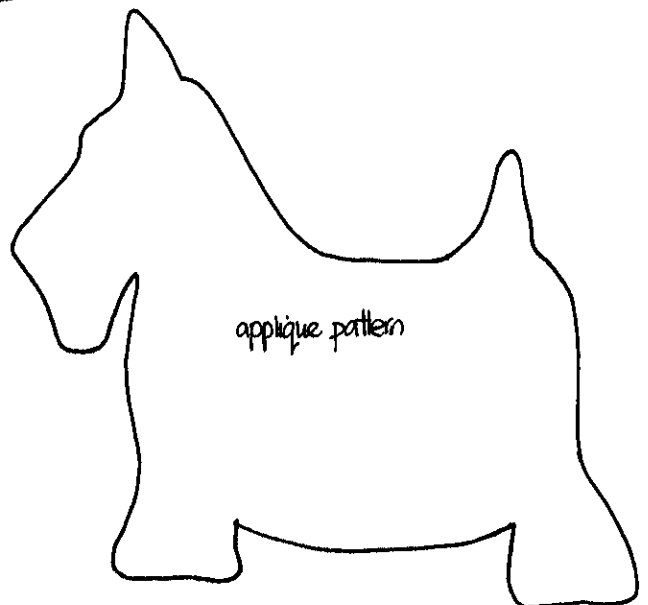
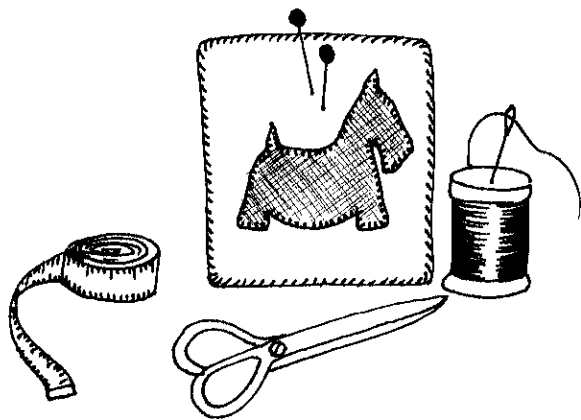
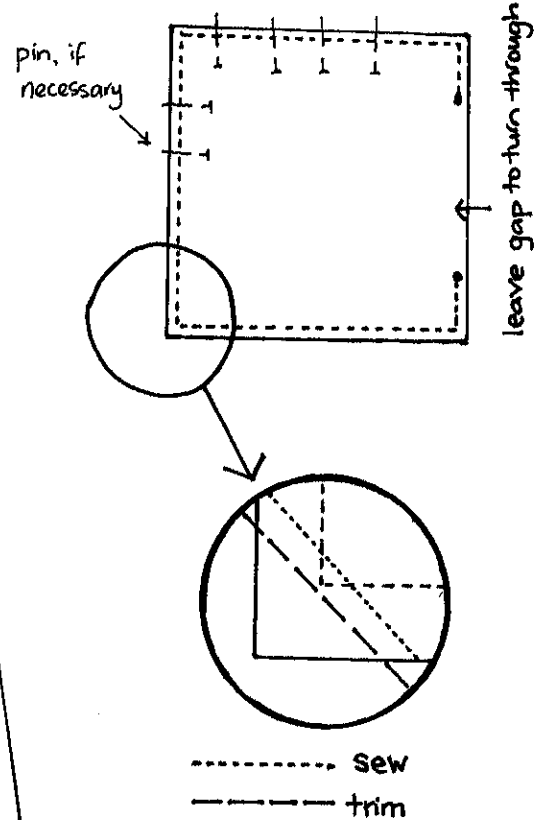


# Good Dog

## pincushion

1. Using a pencil, trace the dog pattern onto the paper side of fusible web.
2. Cut out, leaving roughly a  $\frac{1}{4}$ " margin all around.
3. Iron to the wrong side of dog fabric.
4. When cool, cut out on pencil line.
5. Peel paper away and position dog in centre of wool square. Iron in place.
6. Blanket stitch around the dog, either by hand or machine, using black thread.
7. Put wool square and cotton backing right sides together and press with iron (this helps them 'stick' together a little bit).
8. Using a rotary cutter and ruler, trim to 5" square. NB: make sure that the dog is in the middle!
9. Sew around the square, using a  $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance and leaving a  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " gap on one side.
10. Set stitch length shorter and sew diagonally across each corner.
11. Trim excess fabric from corners and turn through.
12. Stuff evenly with small pieces of stuffing. Don't overstuff or you will stretch the wool fabric.
13. Slip stitch the opening closed.
14. Thread an embroidery needle with three strands of floss and whipstitch all around the outside edge of the pincushion.
14. Finito!! A cute doggie pincushion!!



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
